Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs)

1. When should I arrive?

We recommend arriving Friday evening, beginning at 5:00 pm, although some arrive early Saturday morning. There is no formal check-in process, but there will be a Cracker Barrel available Friday night to meet other participants. The Work Weekend officially begins at 8:00 am, Saturday morning.

2. Where do I sleep?

Participants are encouraged to "camp out" for the weekend in their own tents at Camp Post or Camp Olmsted, however other housing is available in the Gray's Lodge Bunk Room and select Camp Post cabins.

3. Where should I go when I arrive?

If arriving Friday night, we recommend attending the Friday night Cracker Barrel at the Camp Olmsted Dining Hall to meet other Goshen lovers and event attendees.

If arriving Saturday morning before 9:00 am, please join us at the Camp Olmsted Dining Hall to receive your project assignment and meet your work group.

If arriving anytime Saturday morning after 9:00 am, please go to the Olmsted Dining Hall and contact the Reservation Director, Elisabeth Warren, who can assist in pairing you with a work group.

4. Where / when do people eat during the weekend?

The following meals will be served:

Saturday: Breakfast (8:00 am), Lunch (12:30 pm), and Dinner (6:00 pm) Sunday: Breakfast *Please note that dinner will not be served Friday night.*

Meals are prepared by the Goshen Scout Reservation Food Service Director and GSR volunteers.

- What do I do with my car during the weekend? You likely won't need it while you're there, so feel free to park it in a parking lot or a durable surface near your tent.
- 7. What tools should I bring?

Please see the "Project List (Including Recommended Tools) page for recommendations for tools to bring to assist with specific work weekend projects. Other commonly used tools include:

Drill sets, Impact drivers, saws and sawzalls, bolt cutters, socket and ratchet sets, safety glasses, work gloves, work boots, ear protections, paint rollers, paint brushes, measuring tape, carpenters pencil, weed whacker.

Note: Do not bring a chainsaw unless you are BSA chainsaw certified and have arranged with the coordinators.
