PRE-CAMP PLANNING

Your Campsite

All campsites at Camp Ross come equipped with canvas tents on wooden platforms, two cots per tent, picnic tables, a shade fly, and a two stall latrine with a wash stand (and potable water). Campsite preference may be requested as a part of your Pack's registration, and are assigned within two weeks prior to your arrival at Camp Ross. We will do our best to meet your campsite request, but must consider the needs of all Packs attending Camp Ross at that time. Depending on the size of your Pack, you may share a campsite with another unit, however, you will have your own "subsite" within the Campsite just for your Pack.

Adults may be required to share tents with other adults of the same gender. (If leaders are not comfortable sharing a tent with another leader, they may provide their own tent and set it up within the site. Goshen Scout Reservation does not possess the resources to allow each leader to have their own tent).

Spring Parent Meetings - Be Prepared!

We highly recommend hosting a pre-camp meeting with the parents of Scouts who will be attending Camp Ross with your Pack. This will allow you to review the camp program, camp medical and physical requirements, transportation arrangements, uniform requirements, and packing list.

We suggest that Units utilizing GPS services on their way to Goshen use the address above. Google Maps is reported to be the most accurate; we have worked with this service to ensure that the directions are accurate and highlight the best route. Other GPS services will also work with the address above.

The address listed above will bring you to the main entrance of the Goshen Scout Reservation. To reach the entrance for Camp Ross, please proceed NE along Millard Burke Memorial Highway for 2 miles. There will be signs along the right hand side of the road marking distance till your arrival. ARRIVAL DAY & GENERAL INFORMATION

Camp Check-In

When your Pack arrives at Camp Ross, you will be created by members of our Camp Staff and directed to the camp parking lot. Your Pack will be directed on where to unpack your belongings so that our Facilities Team can transport them to your campsite. At this time, you will be introduced to your Site Guide (your Pack's assigned camp staff member for the week), and guided to the Camp Ross Administration building for Medical Checks.

Please ensure that your Pack's Scouting America Annual Health and Medical Forms are prepared for review. All participants staying for more than 72 hours and/or are participating in Aquatics activities must have Part C of the medical form completed (including a physician's signature). Following Medical Checks, your Pack will be guided to your Campsite to unpack, followed by a Camp Tour, given by your Site Guide.

Parking

Parking is available in the Camp Ross Parking Lot, but not in individual campsites. We encourage your Pack to coordinate carpooling and group arrival to reduce vehicle footprint and

allow your Pack to arrive at Camp Ross as close to the same time as possible. Vehicles can access sites to drop off and pick up, and then should be left in the parking lot unless otherwise approved by the Camp Director.

Interested in taking a bus to camp? The Goshen Scout Reservation offers a shuttle bus service to and from the Fairfax Government Center (Fairfax, VA) and Largo Plaza (Largo, MD). Units with at least 45 participants are also eligible for a bus to be sent to a location of their choice. Learn more about the Goshen Bus Service at

Early Departure & Late Arrivals

All youth and adults leaving Camp Ross must sign out at the Camp Ross Administration Office, and check in upon return. Youth are not permitted to leave Camp Ross without direct adult or staff member supervision. A participant (youth and adult), may not depart Camp without first informing a member of the Administrative staff. Any participant arriving after the first day of the camp session (Sunday) must check in at the Camp Ross Administration building for formal check in (including medical check).

Saturday Departure Procedures

Packs must plan to leave by 9:00 am on Saturday morning. Prior to leaving your campsite on Saturday morning, we encourage you to:

- Conduct a final sweep of the campsite (including inside tents) for all personal and Pack items
- Stop by the Dining Hall beginning at 6:30 am for a continental breakfast, including coffee for our adult leaders
- Pick up your Pack's Medical Forms from the Admin Building
- Check the lost and found for personal belongings (moved to the breakfast area)
- For Packs staying in Sites 4, 6, 9, 10, or 11, heavy gear will be arranged to be transported by our Facilities team to the parking lot on Friday afternoon. Please stage gear for pickup at your Campsite latrine platform (more instructions given on site).

Once your Pack is ready to depart, please send one adult leader to the Camp Ross Administration Building to check out and pick up your Pack's Medical Forms.

CAMP ROSS AMENITIES

Trading Post

The Trading Post is Camp Ross' camp store! We carry camping and outdoor gear, supplies for merit badges, snacks and refreshments, and apparel and souvenirs to remind you of your experience at Camp Ross by and have a look around! Times of operation will be posted on the door of the trading post. We carry...

*Pocket knives will only be sold to youth with an adult present, along with proof of their Chef's Knife or Knife Safety adventure completion and permission from their Pack Leader.

Leaders' Lounge

The Camp Ross Leader and Staff Lounge is located in the Camp Ross Administration Building, and is open from 9:00 am to 10:00 pm, except during staff meals (12:30 - 1:00 pm, and 6:00 - 6:30 pm.) The Leaders Lounge is equipped with restrooms, tables for working, and wireless internet. Leaders are also encouraged to utilize the porch area at the front of the Administrative Building or the Dining Hall.

Internet Access for Leaders

We recognize that many adult leaders will need access to the internet for work while at camp. Wi-Fi via newly installed fiberoptic will be provided at the Administration building and Dining Hall; but due to the remote nature of the camp and the need of many staff and leaders, we ask that you use the internet respectfully and only as needed. The Wi-Fi password will be posted in the Leaders' Lounge.

Shower House and Bathrooms

The shower house is located on the backside/downhill from the Dining Hall and Administration Building The shower house contains individual showers and individual bathrooms. We ask that youth campers not use the bathrooms at the shower house during the day unless also taking a shower, and instead use the latrines at their campsite.

The shower house is open between 7:00 am and 10:00 pm except for between 1:00 pm and 2:00 pm for daily cleaning. Youth campers must go to the shower house in a group that is accompanied by adult leaders for supervision and must comply with Youth Protection Guidelines.

Quartermaster (Q.M.)

The Quartermaster is located between the Trading Post and Handicraft Pavilion. The Quartermaster is equipped to assist your unit with projects you wish to complete while at camp. Our Facility Director can assist you in deciding on your service project and gathering the required tools. If you need something outside of open hours, or the facility staff is temporarily out working on a project you can fill out a request slip located in the program office. Please treat all of Ross' equipment with respect by bringing items back in similar condition to which you received them.

What the Q.M. has for your unit:

- Rakes, shovels, and axes for cleaning your fire pit
- Bow saws, spades, rope, hatchets, hammers, nails, and other supplies for service projects

If you are using our facilities and notice something broken or in need of repair please let the Facility Director(FD) know ASAP. Stop by the admin office to fill out a maintenance request form located on the facility directors desk. If it is emergent, inform any admin staff member who will quickly inform the FD.

For other basic supplies stop by the first aid station located on the side of the Administration building. There will be a staff member here 24/7 if you run out of materials in the middle of the night or need to get a hold of any admin staff member staff.

What the First Aid station has for your unit:

Toilet paper, trash bags, and soap/sanitizer

FOOD SERVICE

Food Service

Meals at Camp Ross are provided in a Dining Hall "Family" style. In the Dining Hall, meals are prepared by professional food service staff and served family style (food brought to your table on platters). For copies of the most recent Dining Hall Menu (Standard and Vegetarian), please visit www.gotogoshen.org/information/food-menus/.

Food Allergies and Dietary Restrictions

Food allergies and dietary restrictions must be indicated as part of your unit registration.

Please indicate dietary needs under each participant's information on the online registration system. The Goshen Scout Reservation Food Service and Camp Staff will do our best to accommodate all food allergies and dietary restrictions but cannot be held accountable for the management of these allergies. Notice of severe dietary restrictions should be shared with your Camp's Administrative Team at least 3 weeks prior to your Scout's arrival at camp.

Table Assignments

Tables will be assigned to Packs at the first meal (Sunday Dinner). It is important that all units visit the Dining Hall on their camp tour to understand how meals are administered.

Foil Dinner Night

Tuesday evening in camp, all leaders and scouts will be given the ingredients for a foil dinner to cook in their sites. Wood for this meal should be collected early by the unit and kept dry. Many units bring additional charcoal to make cooking easier. Please send an adult leader to the Dining Hall at 4:30 pm to pick up your food! All food is safe to eat from the Dining hall and only needs to be warmed by a campfire to improve its tastiness! Please also consider using charcoal, there will be some supply available at our Camp Trading Post.

 Turkey Sausage, Bell Peppers, Onions, Potatoes, Jello/Pudding, Salt & Pepper, Tin Foil, and Plastic Flatware

In anticipation of this event, please bring the following:

- Gloves, tongs, etc., to handle the hot aluminum foil packages
- Two to three paring knives to help prepare vegetables
- Cutting Boards
- Charcoal (available at the Trading Post on a limited basis)
- Any spices you think you may need such as salt, pepper, and special flavorings.

Heavy Duty Aluminum foil (foil is provided for the meal; some units prefer more). For more details, see the Official Scout Handbook concerning preparation of aluminum foil meals. Give it a try on a campout before you come to camp!

PROGRAM SCHEDULE STRUCTURE

Your Pack's program schedule while at Camp Ross is broken into two parts. On Monday and Tuesday, your Scouts will be introduced to the safety rules of each program area and participate in introductory activities. During the second remainder of the week, your Pack will have the ability to select the programs you are interested in participating in. Learn more about the program schedule structure below!

Monday & Tuesday

Your Pack will receive a copy of your Monday and Tuesday program schedule during the week's first leader's meeting (Sunday evening). Throughout Monday and Tuesday, your Scouts will be introduced to each program area, traveling together and participating in programs as a group. We encourage leaders to use this time to take a pulse in their Scout's interests in each area to help form your decision on which activities your Pack will want to participate in the remainder of the week.

Wednesday, Thursday, & Friday

The schedule for the second part of the week (Wednesday, Thursday, Friday) is based on what your Pack wants to do! At Monday's evening Leader's Meeting, you will submit a "request sheet" where your Pack will list activity preferences for the remainder of the week, including advancement opportunities and open programs. Other schedulable activities will include hikes to Viewing Rock and the Swimming Hole. We also encourage Pack's to reserve a "Shower Block," where the Shower House becomes designated to your Pack for the hour.

You will receive your Wednesday - Friday schedule at the Tuesday evening Leader's meeting. We will make every effort to accommodate your first choice schedule!

PROGRAM ACTIVITIES

2025 CAMP THEME: MYTHIC HEROES

Prepare for a legendary summer of Greek gods and extraordinary heroes of myth, like Jason, Atalanta, and Perseus. Train your skills at Archery and BBs, prepare for your next quest at Scoutcraft, harness the lake at Aquatics, hone your talents at Handicraft, and explore the wilderness at Nature. Don't get lost in the labyrinth - find your way to Camp Ross this summer!

Activities below are subject to change. The list includes many of the standard activities we offer each summer, but other new activity options may be available once you arrive at camp, as our creative staff create ever more fun activities to excite and delight the campers.

Aquatics

Head on down to our Waterfront and have a blast in lake Merriweather. Swim checks and Boating are held on Monday and Tuesday, and Packs can sign up for additional Boating, Swimming, Aquanaut, or our Water Trampoline for Wednesday-Friday!

Monday, Tuesday

Swim Test (Monday)

Scouts will be able to take the Scouting America Swim Test, which will allow them to participate in Aquatics activities for the rest of the week.

Boating (Tuesday)

Scouts learn the basics of paddling and test their skills as they paddle around the lake.

Wednesday, Thursday, Friday

Aquanaut (Webelos) and Swimming (Arrow of Light)

Grab your swimsuits and buddy tags and hit the water! Scouts will earn the Aquanaut and Swimming Elective Adventures.

(Earns the Aquanaut and Swimming Elective Adventure)

Free Swim

Scouts get the opportunity to Swim in the Swimming area with their friends and their pack.

Open Boating

Scouts get the opportunity to explore the boating area with their friends and their Pack.

Paddle Onward (Webelos) and Paddle Craft (Arrow of Light)

Scouts test their boating skills to complete tasks around the lake and challenge themselves over their boat.

(Earns the Boating Onward and Paddle Craft Elective Adventure)

Trampoline w/ Slide (New 2025!)

Scouts get the opportunity to participate on the aqua trampoline rotating in and out of free swim.

Archery

Spend some time feeling like Robin Hood showing off your skill as an Archer. Monday and Tuesday offer basic instruction, and Wednesday-Friday Scouts can shoot long distances, bring their own targets and on Friday compete for the Coveted Golden Arrow!

Monday, Tuesday

Scouts learn the rules of the Archery Range and basics of how to shoot.

Wednesday, Thursday, Friday

Archery Webelos and Archery Arrow of Light

Scouts can earn the Archery Elective Adventure for Webelos and Arrow of Light ranks.

Bring Your Own Target (BYOT)

Scouts have the opportunity to bring their own targets to fire upon.

(Targets must be approved by the Area Director)

Distance Shooting

Scouts can challenge themselves by shooting at targets at different distances, and seeing who can hit the target from the farthest away.

Open Shoot

Scouts and Adult leaders get the entire block to just go and shoot on the range.

BB's

Hone your Marksman skills at our BB's Range, learning the discipline necessary to safely use an air powered BB Rifle! Make sure to check out our Shooting award sessions, bring your own target, or compete for the Golden BB Friday!

Monday, Tuesday

Scouts learn the rules of the BBs Range and basics of how to shoot.

Wednesday, Thursday, Friday

BB Gun Webelos and BB Gun Arrow of Light

Scouts can earn the BB Gun Elective Adventure for Webelos and Arrow of Light ranks.

Open Shoot

Scouts and Adult leaders get the entire block to just go and shoot on the range.

Bring Your Own Target (BYOT)

Scouts have the opportunity to bring their own targets to fire upon.

(Targets must be approved by the Area Director)

Handicraft

Take something to take home from Camp Ross, from Paracord projects, Gimp lanyards, pocket knife sheaths, tie dye and more! Get creative and make memories that you can share with your family when you get home from Camp.

Monday, Tuesday

Handicraft will have a theme based craft, which they will work to complete and finish, over the first two days.

2025 Craft: Mini Mosaics

In Ancient Greece, mosaics were used to depict scenes from Greek mythology. Join us in creating your own mosaic. Which story will you tell?

On Monday, we will design our mosaics and create them on Tuesday.

Wednesday, Thursday, Friday

Escape Room

Can you outriddle the sphinx? Work together to escape her lair!

Leatherwork

Scouts learn how to stamp and put together leatherworking kits that they can use. As of 2025, materials are provided to you!

Beaded Animal Keychains

Scouts will create their own mythical beaded companion!

Tie-Dye

Scouts learn how to and then make tie-dye shirts using different colors and designs. As of 2025, materials are provided to you!

Nature

Spend some time with Turtles and Frogs and Snakes oh my! Check out our Nature program to learn about Leave no Trace, the Animals and Plants of Goshen, the Solars system, or earn Into the Woods, Into the Wild, and Earth Rocks adventure pins!

Monday, Tuesday

Introduction (Monday)

Scouts are introduced to the different animals found at Camp Ross, including snakes, spiders, turtles, frogs, and many other animals, while going over the rules of the Area.

Wednesday, Thursday, Friday

Catch the Big One (Webelos) and Fishing (Arrow of Light)

Scouts go to the lakeside of our beautiful Lake Merriweather and go fishing for one of our many fish species. Covers preparations needed to earn Catch the Big One (Webelos) and Fishing (Arrow of Light) Adventures. Finish up the Adventure by going fishing in your spare time!

(Live Bait not included, but available at the Trading Post)

Critter Hunt

Scouts go out to find different animals throughout our camp. Oftentimes finding frogs and newts along our creek beds.

Critter Time

Scouts get a chance to interact and hold our many animals at the nature center such as turtles, frogs, and snakes.

Leave No Trace and the Outdoor Code (Tuesday)

Scouts will learn the Leave No Trace Principles for Kids and the Scouting Outdoor Code through a series of games and activities. Join us in our campwide cleanup challenge!

Earth Rocks (Webelos)

Scouts learn about the geological features and the different types of rocks and how they form.

(Earns Earth Rocks Elective Adventure)

Into the Wild (Arrow of Light)

Scouts Learn about the different animal life in the area, the food chain, and how animals interact with each other in their environments. (Earns Into the Wild Elective Adventure)

Into the Woods (Arrow of Light)

Scouts learn about the different trees and plants in the area while also understanding the different parts of the tree and how they grow.

(Earns Into the Woods Elective Adventure)

Scoutcraft

Jump back in time to the roots of Scouting and learn knot tying, fire building, campfire cooking and how to work as a team to overcome obstacles. Learn about the skills that form the foundation of camping and know you'll be able to go out and camp anywhere!

Monday, Tuesday

Knot Tying (Monday)

At Scoutcraft, Scouts will learn and practice learning basic knots, including the square knot, two half hitches, taut line hitch, and bowline!

Wednesday, Thursday, Friday

Advanced Knot Tying

Scouts use the skills previously learned and expand upon them with more challenging knots.

Fire Building

Scouts learn the basics of fire safety and how to make their fire using matches and a bird's nest.

The Diamond W Award

The Diamond W Award can be earned by your Pack over the course of the Week at Camp Ross. Earning the award shows your Pack's spirit for the Camp Ross Program and earns your pack the right to display our "Camp Diamond W" Ribbon on your Pack/Den Flag. In addition, award patches are available at the Trading post. To earn the Award packs must:

- Have an average weekly campsite inspection score of 23 or higher scoring is based on
- Campsite cleanliness (5 points), Tent neatness (5 points), Latrine (Toilet) cleanliness (5 points), Campfire safety (5 points), and General Campsite Safety (10 points)
- Learn the Outdoor code at Nature
- Hike to Viewing Rock or the Swimming hole
- Complete a Camp service project, either at Camp Ross or a project listed on the website with approval from the Camp Director

SAFETY AT CAMP ROSS

Site Guides

One or more staff members will be assigned to be your Site Guide for the week. Their duties include being a liaison between the unit and the camp staff in addition to assisting and guiding your unit throughout the week. If you have any questions or needs while at camp, your Site Guide(s) are there to be a resource for your unit. If you have issues reaching your Site Guide while at camp, please let the Camp Administration team know.

Buddy System

All participants at Camp Ross should adhere to the buddy system at all times at Camp. The buddy system helps to ensure that scouts and leaders are staying safe in camp and that all scouts are accounted for at all times. Buddy pairs should be single gender, unless in groups of 3 or more scouts.

First Aid

The Camp Ross First Aid office is open 24/7 during daytime hours the office is manned by the staff first aider, in the evening the first aid office is manned by a member of the staff who can offer assistance.

All injuries at Camp Ross must be reported to the First Aider, no matter the severity. More information for first aid procedures, including the Goshen Scout Reservation Health Lodge for more serious injuries, can be found in the Goshen Scout Reservation Leader Guide.

Participants with Special Needs

We will make any necessary accommodations to provide a welcoming and positive program for all participants. Please contact us at least 1-2 weeks in advance of your arrival so we can work with you to develop a plan to provide the best possible programming.

Wildlife

Goshen Scout Reservation is home to scouts only for a short six weeks of the year. During the summer and all other times of year Goshen is home to many wildlife including Raccoons, Rabbits, Squirrels, Deer, Bear, and more. If it is noticed that wildlife are overly comfortable around participants it must be reported to the Camp Administrative Staff. **The storage of food in the campsite overnight is prohibited**, all food and trash must be locked in a vehicle in the camp parking lot or deposited in the dumpster prior to bedding down for the night. Please follow these instructions as closely as possible to avoid uncomfortable interaction with our Goshen Wildlife.
