#### Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs)

1. When should I arrive?

We recommend arriving Friday evening, beginning at 5:00 pm, although some arrive early Saturday morning. The Service Weekend officially begins at 8:00 am, Saturday morning.

2. Where should I go when I arrive?

Upon arrival, please check in at Gray's Lodge at Camp Post, where you will be checked in. Please bring a copy of your completed Medical Form (Parts A and B) for submission with our Camp Health Officer.

If arriving Saturday morning before 9:00 am, please join us at the Gray's Lodge (Camp Post) to receive your project assignment and meet your work group.

If arriving anytime Saturday morning after 9:00 am, please go to the Gray's Lodge (Camp Post) and contact the Reservation Director, Elisabeth Warren, who can assist in pairing you with a work group.

3. Where do I sleep?

Participants are encouraged to camp out for the weekend in their own tents throughout the grounds at Camp Post. Select housing is available in the Gray's Lodge bunk room for adult male participants. If you are in need of other accommodations, please contact the Reservation Director prior to arrival.

4. Where / when do people eat during the weekend? The following meals will be served:

Drill sets, Impact drivers, saws and sawzalls, bolt cutters, socket and ratchet sets, safety glasses, work gloves, work boots, ear protections, paint rollers, paintbrushes, measuring tape, carpenters pencil, weed whacker.

Note: Do not bring a chainsaw unless you are BSA chainsaw certified and have arranged with the coordinators.
